# 2023 Q2 STAKEHOLDER REPORT

### **Executive summary**

- Completed phase I of our workforce development initiative (<u>MemWorks</u>) and published our findings about the <u>population</u>, <u>employment roadblocks</u>, and <u>employment myths</u>
- Spoke about the need for outcomes-driven decision-making at the Mentoring Matters in TN summit and the nonprofit management program at Christian Brothers University
- Agreed to work alongside 5 new poverty-fighting organizations, bringing the total number we work with to 51 organizations
- Welcomed <u>Fred Towler</u> (Retired, International Paper) and <u>John Martinez</u> (Vice President, MDRC) and to our board of directors
- Received a <u>half a million dollar investment</u> from Tommie & Billy Dunavant and celebrated the Thomas W. Briggs Foundation as a new Principal Investor

# INSIGHTS

**Poverty-fighting benefits of home repairs.** Programs that provide home repairs for households with low-incomes can be a tool for increasing stability and reducing crime. According to HUD, nearly 1 million U.S. households in 2019 lacked basic features such as plumbing, electricity, or heat. 75 percent of participants in an emergency <u>home repair</u> program in Detroit stated they would not have been able to make the repairs without the program. In Philadelphia, <u>a program</u> found that street blocks with houses that had been repaired experienced less crime than similar streets, and that even less crime occurred if more houses on the block had received repairs.

Improving healthy food choices for youth. According to the <u>U.S. Center for Disease Control &</u> <u>Prevention</u> (CDC), 42 percent of children in the State of Tennessee eat less than one vegetable per day and 36 percent eat less than one fruit per day. To help promote healthier eating, farm-to-school programs have been implemented by schools and early-childhood organizations. These programs use various approaches such as gardening, farm visits, culinary classes, and taste-testing fresh food from local farms to help teach children about healthy food by engaging all five senses. <u>Evidence shows</u> well-designed farm-to-school activities improve the quality of children's diets by increasing daily fruit and vegetable intake and willingness to try new fruits and vegetables.

## **MOVEMENT**

**Memphis Works for Everyone (MemWorks).** We concluded the first phase of the MemWorks initiative and recently published the <u>MemWorks website</u> and <u>Insights page</u>. These tools are a resource for our community to understand the underlying, root causes for why employment pathways are not connecting Memphians experiencing poverty with living-wage jobs. We invite you to review these initial reports to better understand the current situation for <u>Memphians experiencing poverty</u>, the <u>major roadblocks</u> they face to living-wage employment, and several <u>employment myths</u> that are not substantiated by evidence.
